



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#### From the Pastor's Heart

# Let every person be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger. James 1:19

Thoughts on the watchword for the month of July 2019:



'Slow' - this word doesn't go down very well in our fast-paced time. Oftentimes, we are not allowed to do things a little slower, especially when we are still in the workplace.

But precisely because our days are often so hectic and restless, it can help us to remember the importance of a break, a pause. Nature gives us good examples of this.

One of the examples of this is that of a snail. Slowly and thoughtfully, the snail moves. Everything excited, quick and restless is unknown to it. Quiet and measured, almost plump and unwieldy are its movements. It represents one of the prime symbols of slowness. In contrast to the snail's slow movements is its delicate feelers. They move at lightning speed, are extremely sensitive to any danger and obstacle. It is

because the snail's feelers react so delicately and sensitively, so quickly and at lightning speed, that its body can move slowly and serene. - Maybe we humans too need this wonderful mix of a delicate, watchful, measured, thoughtful and quiet way of life.

If our heart could be aware and watchful to perceive everything dangerous and adverse with sensitivity and calm, we probably wouldn't have to run around so restlessly. We would perceive the things of life quickly and sensitively, and go our way calmly and thoughtfully.

Praying for and trusting in God's provision and guidance are ways to "stretch out" our delicate feelers and go into the day with love and thoughtfulness, with peace and serenity to work and play. This is my prayer and wish for all of us for each new day.

Prayer: Lord, we often run and chase through life so restlessly. Help the inner feelers become finer and more sensitive to our deepest needs, to our fellow human beings and to You again.

# Information on Congregation's Financial Needs

#### **Appreciation**

For those Congregation Members who may not have been able to attend our last AGM report back and discussion your Church Committee would like to sincerely thank all Congregation Members and Friends who have diligently contributed last year. At the same time more volunteers are encouraged to partner with others that will help share the load of those already contributing.

#### **Background information**

Our congregation's car loan is to be paid up by November 2019. The 2018 advance car loan target planned for payments in 2019 totalled R3,070 was carried to 2019. In the 2018 year, R33,293 of the MTL Budgetary Target of R41,250 was achieved. The shortfall of (R7,957) has been carried over to 2019 and added to R41,250 to round off the target of R49,000. The 2019 Budgetary estimate of our 5 year Maintenance plan is R17,000. The total 2019 budgeted Belltower Projects is in the amount of R66,000



# LUCSA youth discuss LWF's priorities for youth

Youth from 15 member churches of the Lutheran Communion in Southern Africa (LUCSA) have identified climate change and gender-based violence as key issues to address in their respective countries.

Meeting mid-April, in Johannesburg, South Africa, barely month after the devastating impact of cyclone Idai in Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe, they resolved to set up a sub-regional network to encourage youth participation in activities that promote care for the creation and environmental protection. Prolonged drought and shorter but intense periods of rainfall in the subregion threaten the livelihoods of rural populations, who mainly depend on subsistence farming and herding livestock.

Mgwaza noted that barely a fort-

This just reminds us again why we have to continue advocating for climate justice. The weather patterns have changed and often authorities are not prepared to cope with the aftermath and help their people.

LWF Council member Khulekani Sizwe Magwaza, Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa night after the workshop, another tropical storm struck South Africa's eastern coastline around Durban between 22-23 April, killing more than 50 people, with flooding and mudslides destroying homes and property. Participants in the workshop included Rev. Zelda Cristina Cossa from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Mozambique, who reflected about cyclone Idai and recurring torrential rainfall in the country. "These tropical storms provide grim proof that global warming is a real and continuing threat. Effective adaptation to minimize damage is essential in preparing people in the region. Disaster risk management plans are especially important in order to minimize loss of life," added, Cossa.

At the LWF Twelfth Assembly in 2017, the member churches reiterated youth participation and leadership as priority themes for the communion. The LWF strategy acknowledges the critical role of youth leadership in strengthening LWF's commitment to addressing climate change as a matter of intergenerational justice.

The LWF Strategy 2019-2024 provided under the theme, "With Passion for the Church and the World".

#### The rights of women and girls

The LUCSA youth also cited examples of increasing incidents of sexual and gender-based violence especially in families in countries such as Namibia and South Africa, and the general lack of commitment by authorities to hold perpetrators to account. They noted that is a gross violation of the rights of women and girls, and "we are committed to tackling it in all its forms as best as we are able."

Magwaza encouraged the workshop participants to improve their life skills and develop positive behavioural changes in order to better serve the church and the wider society.

"It is about young people developing personal values and qualities which enable them to effectively play a key role in the church's growth and sustainability and in society's social development agenda," they said in a final statement.

# **Brokenness and Healing**

In 2007 our Friedenskirche Young Adults and Youth Group started a project.

Here is an extract of their story:

The two youth meetings we had in early 2007 were packed with artistic excitement thanks to our innovative youth and our equally talented assistants to help us.

The theme was, "From brokenness to healing" and they started off by mom's old (hopefully) bashing mugs, glasses, plates and mirrors to pieces, whilst thinking of something that has caused us pain or more to the point, has caused to break inside. That was really fun and did the world of good. You don't get the chance to simply break something for the sake of breaking it everyday. Here our frustrations, our anger, our hurt or simply our wish to break something had a field day. Then the question was, how do we 'fix' things when they go wrong? All agreed that, however hard we try, that broken cup, mirror or plate would never look the same again. It also became clear to us that the pain and the brokenness we experience in our lives is not all that simple, you cannot just 'fix' it. So, where do we go? Who do we turn to when things fall apart and break in our lives?

# How can we become whole again?



One of our assistants made a big wooden cross for us. That was the direction we took with our broken pieces and we glued them all onto the cross.

The end-result was a beautiful mosaic creation that everyone could be proud of. And, although the pieces that were glued together, did not make a cup, a plate or a mirror, they did, in a bizarre way, become whole again on the cross; they again were part of something whole.

The cross shows us that God became a part of our brokenness in that he himself broke (died) on the cross. That's why we are not alone in our brokenness and that's also why we can bring



our broken pieces to the place that proves that God cares about the things that hurt us, and the place where we can become whole again. In our next meeting we grouted the cross with black grout, in order to bring out all the beautiful colours of the mosaic.

We were made aware of the fact that we have times and places in our lives where it can become very dark and difficult, where we struggle to see



the good things in life. Sometimes it takes a lot of rubbing and scratching to see the goodness and the colour of life again. We also saw how the colours of the broken pieces on the cross came out

clearer and more beautiful with the black grout around it.

The final product is beautiful and is standing in our church. Every Sunday we are reminded where we can go with our brokenness – the one place where we will never be turned away!

It showed us that, sometimes we need to go through dark and difficult times to see how good the life that God gave us really is; also, that we needn't fear the darkness, because God does not leave us alone there. He helps us find our way again.
