Being cautious in our optimism ...

advancements have Huge been achieved worldwide in dealing with the Covid virus pandemic. However the few basic simple fundamental safety precautions remain effective. On 30.09.2021 the President of the RSA announced an easing of Covid restrictions from adjusted level 2 to adjusted level 1. Letting our guard down now is not the thing to do. It is predicted that a 4th wave is hit the country towards the end of the year. The RSA government has ramped up its vaccination programme. It has announced that all over 18's can register to be vaccinated at any vaccination health care facility with or without medical aid. Vaccination is free to everyone living in South Africa without waiting for an sms to confirm date or site. The new Vooma Vaccination Weekend initiative has started to assist those who are working and struggle to get to vaccination sites in the week. The aim is to boost the vaccination goal of 70% by December 2021. If this is achieved, it is estimated that 20'000 lives can be saved if this target is achieved. Even one life lost is one too many.

Although we can allow ourselves to be more optimistic than before, now is not the time to throw caution to the wind. We are reminded that even when you have been vaccinated, the wearing of masks, frequent washing and sanitising of hands, social distancing, following regulations and Covid safety protocols still apply. Probably now more than ever at adjusted Level 1. The present reduced infection rate may give some of our exhausted front-line workers a chance at some rest.

Let us remain in hope that we can soon embrace one another once again as we so long to do.



The radio operator reacted immediately and relayed a message by radio to the approaching light: "Unknown ship, you are on a collision course. Change your direction of travel by 10 degrees to starboard."

The answer came back: "No! You have to change the direction of travel!"

The warship immediately replied back with this message: "We are a warship of the United States Navy, you are to change your course by 10 degrees starboard."

And again the short and concise answer came back: "NO"!

Finally the admiral was woken up and the situation described to him. He delivered the following message: "We are a warship on official maneuver. I hereby order you to change your direction of travel immediately, this is Admiral Peacock of the US Navy."

Shortly afterwards the response came: "No! Here is seaman Smith, I am the night watch at lighthouse X."

How often do we not feel like these guys on the warship that we are of the opinion that we do not need to steer our direction or our life at all onto a new course. We rather think, that a lot has to change around us. But, dear readers, one thing is clear and has been for centuries. The clear and bright light of God's Word to us never changes, no matter how often we humans think that we have to wrap the Bible into a "more modern garment" so that it can be read by the people again.

The Bible is and remains, for us, like a steadfast light on our way, which wants to point the way for our lives.

With these thoughts, I wish to encourage you to read your bible again. No matter which translation. The core message remains the same.


The Festival of the Reformation

On 31st October we will be celebrating Reformation day. Hence let us briefly look at Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michaelangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, "captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans."

In these days Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. "I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God." Then, in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a "merciful God justifies us by faith ... I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates."


What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, "Faith is God's work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times."

This discovery set Luther's life on a new course -both his own life and his public service as a preacher and teacher. When a church-endorsed "sales team" came to the Wittenberg area in October, 1517, Luther was concerned that the promotion and sale of indulgences undermined the promise of God's unreserved mercy in Jesus and the faith that trusts that promise. His 95 Theses or Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences became the first of a lifelong stream of books, sermons, letters, essays, even hymns in which he expressed his confidence in this lifegiving promise from God, the Gospel, and its liberating implications for all of life in church and society. One of these Hymns is: "A mighty fortress is our God..."

Perceiving one another

Hebrew 10:24

Looking out for each other and caring for each other has - thank God - now become easier again. The monthly verse for October encourages us to do this.

The context of the saying from the Letter to the Hebrews picks up an image of the Old Testament worship service, where it was impossible for the ordinary believer to enter the Sanctum ("Holy of Holies"). No one but the high priest was allowed to enter this place in the temple where God was present in a special way.

At the time of writing the letter to the Hebrews, the temple was already in ruins. But the writer takes the temple as an image for the new way to the relationship with God, the way through Jesus Christ. No longer any need for a high priest, now the sanc-

tum is love. Whoever has love in his heart, as it is revealed in Jesus, may approach God.

How does love manifest itself?

Love lives from paying attention to each other and earning each other's respect, especially in the Christian community. We humans are designed for community, so we are relational beings. Even though some may live alone, we can pray for each other, be there for each other "with heart, mouth and hands" and thus be in a living community.

In this community, we may sometimes have intense and passionate discussions and conflicts, but that is not bad and is part of it. Sometimes, however, it happens that everyone is only caught up in their own arguments, in their own sensitivities, hurts and grievances. What others say is no longer recognized. Frustrated, some then terminate the conversation or even leave the community.

When this happens, we have not been carefully enough.

Paying Attention

The author of the letter has concrete suggestions for this "paying attention to one another". We are to motivate each other, to treat each other, with love and to do kind things. We should mercifully encourage each other to live our daily lives in a positive way.

Sometimes this even means turning a blind eye, so that the other person does not feel constricted because of

all the attention - but feels the spirit of freedom that is described in the Bible.

That is why the writer of the letter asks (in verse 25, which follows the October verse) not to leave the community. So that the conversation does not break off and love always has a new chance. I really want to belong to such a community!

We are included

"Let us consider how to provoke one another to love " This is a call in the "we" form. In the original, it applies to the "Hebrews" to whom the letter was written, and today it applies to us - we are included!

So I also see donors as such; a large community, in which each one spurs the other on to love and good works. I am grateful for this community!

Tithing Sunday

Tithing has its roots in the Biblical narrative of Abraham presenting a tenth of the war spoils to Melchizedek, the king of Salem. In the Old Testament, Jews brought 10% of their harvest to a storehouse as a welfare plan for the needy or in case of famine.

In Matthew 23:23 and Luke 11:42 referred Jesus to tithing as that should something not be neglected... "Woe to you, teachers of Pharisees, the law and hypocrites! You give a tenth of your spices-mint, dill and cumin. But you have neglected the more important matters of the law-justice, mercy and faithfulness.

What does the Bible say about tithing today? Leviticus 27:30 says, "A tithe of everything from the land, whether grain from the soil or fruit from the trees, belongs to the Lord: it is holy to the Lord." These gifts were a reminder that everything belonged to God and a portion was given back to God to thank him for what they had received.

Where do you give tithes? The right thing to do and the right place where tithe should be paid is no other place than the local church. The payment should be made at the local church because that is where the spiritual benefits are being derived.

In keeping with tradition, we will again celebrate Thanksgiving and Tithing Sunday together in a family service on **24 October at 9:30 am**.

God's blessing is all important



Ihr sät viel und bringt wenig ein; ihr esst und werdet doch nicht satt; ihr trinkt und bleibt doch durstig; ihr kleidet euch, und keinem wird warm; und wer Geld verdient, der legt's in einen löchrigen Beutel.

Are material things more important than spiritual?

The prophet Haggai worked in a turbulent time. The Jewish people had returned to Jerusalem from Babylonian captivity. But the most important places of worship had been destroyed. In addition, there was a catastrophic economic situation: a long period of drought and the reintegration of the returnees caused great difficulties. The people were therefore more concerned with themselves and their problems than with the rebuilding of the Temple. Yet this temple was understood to be the place of God's presence with his people. This led to a conflict between the supporters of an early rebuilding and its opponents.

The prophet Haggai comments on this conflict: The people - he writes - say that the time for the rebuilding of the temple has not yet come. But these same people lived "in paneled houses". While the house of God stood in ruins on the Temple Mount, they had enough time and money to build their own houses.

Material things alone do not make you rich

That is why Haggai holds up a mirror to the people. He speaks of five everyday things - sowing, eating, drinking, dressing and earning money - and contrasts these activities with the results. Although the people have worked hard, the yield is not as desired. Haggai reports a meagre harvest, hunger and thirst, scanty clothing and financial lack. What had happened?

Apparently, the pursuit of material things did not automatically lead to prosperity and contentment. One might have known: When the temple, which is still in ruins here, was being built, Psalm 127 was written. This can be overwritten with: All depends on God's blessing. In their alienation from God, the people had obviously forgotten this. The ruins of the temple were an eloquent sign of this.

Watchword (Micah 6:8):

"He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

What is right? What is wrong? In a world where I often see only shades of grey, I would like to have: exact moral principles and behavioural standards, so that I can line up with them. The 20th Sunday after Trinity meets this need: "It has told you, o mortal, what is good," you can find out what real life can look like. There is the Bible, which teaches a worthy and respectful way of dealing with one another, and institutions such as marriage, which are good to live together as two people. Above all orders, however, is the well-being of the human being. If rules are applied slavishly and used to humiliate people, then they do the opposite, then they no longer enhance to the Christian spirit of love and freedom.

Watchword (Psalm 145:15):

The giant pumpkin and the full ears, the honeycomb and the bread – in the richly decorated harvest altar, the abundance of nature and fruits of labour are quite evident. We need to hear that we have a generous God who cares about our lives and wants to free us from our anxieties and help us to see beyond our own needs towards responsible sharing. Thanksgiving is a reminder of that what is really important in life, we can only but but receive.

Sermon 2 Corinthians 9:6-15

31 October 2021 (E+D, Fam) Reformation Day



Watchword (1 Corinthians 3:11)
"No one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ."

Where do I come from? Where are my roots? On the day of the Reformation (31 October), Lutheran Christians reflect on their origins: at the same time, they celebrate the confession and birthday of the Protestant church. This day is reminiscent of the story of the stubborn monk, who nails his 95 theses to the Wittenberg Castle Church in a waving robe, causing a stir throughout Europe. Martin Luther was not a saint, but a man who deeply influenced the Church with his steadfastness, his ardent questions about God, and his courageous commitment to his faith. After his example, many Christians worked on the renewal of the church and still do today. Therefore, the Reformation Day also asks about current grievances and about the Church, which has to reform itself again and again.

Parable of the Sower



Jesus told his friends about God again and again. But they did not always understand him. That is why Jesus often spoke in parables. He compared God to a situation that his friends knew.

Some fell on the rock; and as it grew up, it withered for lack of moisture. Some fell among thorns, and the thorns grew with it and choked it. Some fell into good soil, and when it grew, it produced a hundredfold.' As he said this, he called out, 'Let anyone with ears to hear listen!'

In the parable Jesus is the sower and he sows His seeds wherever he goes. The sower is generous and scatters His seed everywhere no matter what soil it lands on. That is true with God. God generously gives us everything we need. God also calls us to help him sow His seed.


What is seed?

Jesus tells us that the seed is God's word. It is the truth about Jesus – the Good News – the Gospel. There are different ways to share the good news. We can invite a friend to church or share bible stories. We can also sing and write about it.


What is the soil that we are scattering on?

We are like different types of soil. First there is the path where the birds snatched the seed. Some of us hear the word but it is snatched away, and we do not take it into our hearts. Some of us stop being excited about Jesus, and the words of God dry up in our hearts. The seed that fell amongst thorns were choked. Some people get worried by other things, so that the word of God cannot take root in their hearts. Lastly there is the good soil. When our hearts have good soil, God's word will grow in our hearts.
