

An Obituary printed in the London Times

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, **Common Sense**, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

- Knowing when to come in out of the rain;
- Why the early bird gets the worm;
- Life isn't always fair;
- and maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well-intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a 6-year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly

student, only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children.

It declined even further when schools were required to get parental consent to administer sun lotion or an aspirin to a student; but could not inform parents when a student became pregnant and wanted to have an abortion.

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims.

Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realize that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death, by his parents, Truth and Trust, by his wife, Discretion, by his daughter, Responsibility, and by his son. Reason.

He is survived by his 4 stepbrothers

- * I Know My Rights
- * I Want It Now
- * Someone Else Is To Blame
- * I'm A Victim

Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone.

Pastor's Heart

Dear Members and Friends of the Church of Peace!

Our Lord Jesus Christ puts the following words to our hearts: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you," Matthew 7:7

Prayer is one of the most blessed places where the heart can go to meet the Lord. In Luke 11:1 we read, "And it came to pass, that, as he was praying in a certain place, when he ceased, one of his disciples said unto him, Lord, teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples." The Lord Jesus is teaching us In Matthew 7:7 what is contained in prayer; He is teaching us how to pray.

In His Sermon on the Mount, our Saviour sets forth the distinction so we are able to "...discern between the righteous and the wicked, between those that serve God and those who serve him not," Maleachi 3:18.

Jesus has given such heart-searching admonitions against hypocritical judgment as in Mathew 7:1-6. These verses tell us not to judge and of the beam of self-righteousness which we have by nature in our own eye; then He teaches us that we are not to cast that which is holy before dogs. All of these are admonitions.

He now turns to our need to pray for that Spirit of Christ as we see in His teaching in Luke 11:9-13, Luke's counterpart to our text.

Seen in the context of the whole Scripture, we realise the Lord Jesus

is teaching us, in the passage, that we must have the Holy Spirit in order to rightly understand the commandments which He just gave us in verses 1-6. We must have that Spirit of Christ. Therefore, He is teaching us, "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you,"

We are to ask for the Spirit of Christ to enable us to observe the things He has just commanded. We need that Spirit, so we come in a humble, child-like spirit to our fellow man when we come to exhort him, so we do not come in a self-righteous, hypocritical attitude.

We cannot expect to receive anything unless we ask in the Spirit of Christ, and in His name. Look at John 15:7, "If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, you shall ask what you will, and it shall be done unto you." That sounds like a very broad statement, but it is qualified. If you abide in me means in the Spirit of Christ.

How can He make such a broad statement? When you ask in the Spirit of Christ, you are not asking anything outside His will. If you abide in His Spirit, you will never ask for anything outside the will of God. "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you." We are to ask for the Spirit of Christ, especially considering Luke's account, as the main thrust of our prayers. We are to ask in total submission in the spirit, in which Christ prayed, "...nevertheless not as I will, but as you will," Matthew 26:39b. That is the Spirit of Christ in which we must ask.

We must ask in a childlike faith with a forgiving spirit. Remember in the verses Matthew 7:1-6, Jesus taught about hypocritical judging. He talked about judging, forgiving, the need of exhortation, and bringing forth the faults of our fellow man. How must we do this? The answer is prayerfully, in the Spirit of Christ, and in a forgiving spirit.

Pausing!



May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ. 2 Thessalonians 3:5

"Pausing" - this was the first word that came to my mind when I read the above words from the 2nd letter to the Thessalonians. To pause in the midst of all the hustle and bustle of everyday life. And this is not only about the outer "pause", but also about an inner one. The "pause" of the heart.

What do I direct it towards? In this letter, Paul invites us to let our hearts look towards the love of God - that is, away from everyday worries, from hectic and stress, from discontent and strife. He invites us to let our own hearts be touched and filled anew by the love of God.

And he invites us to do something else as well: namely, to recognise that everything we do is always under the sign of provisionality. In the end, Jesus will come again. That is the

goal - and not what we achieve here or what we fail at.

Anyone who thinks that Paul is calling for a pious flight from the world is very much mistaken. The opposite is the case. For it is only when I "pause", look at God's love and Jesus' deeds and his return, that I get the grounding and orientation that allows me to go in the right direction in everyday life.

And another tip: Open the window in the morning and listen to the birds in peace. Calm down and interpret what the melody wants to tell you for the day.

And Paul makes it clear that God Himself empowers us: "The LORD establish your hearts ... !" Paul expresses that we do not have to struggle, do not align ourselves by our own strength: God Himself will align the church!

And so that we do not forget this "pause", there is Sunday. Discover it anew for yourself. It is worth it.

We are so grateful that we can again offer a divine service every Sunday in the Church of Peace. Many thanks to all who make this possible through their commitment. We look forward to welcoming you. 

The following regulations apply:

- Max. 45 persons per service
- Bring and wear your face mask the whole time. Sanitize and sign the Register.when entering the church
- ♦ 3 persons per pew (1-1-1) or for couples (2- -1), larger families from the same household can sit together
- every second pew remains free
- foyer and mezzanine have additional chairs 1.5 m apart
- The Organ will play and you can sing the hymns. The lyrics will be projected (no hymn books).
- Communion is received individually (disposable cups)
- No gatherings before/after service.

Below is an overview of the daily number of people actively infected with the Corona virus in the Eastern Cape (EC red) and the neighbouring provinces of the Western Cape (WC dark blue), Northern Cape (NC orange), Free State (FS light blue), KwaZulu Natal (KN green), and for comparison, South Africa as a whole (ZA dotted black). For better comparison, the data was scaled to persons with the disease per 100,000 inhabitants. The period is 1 May 2020 to 27 October 2021.

Watchword (2 Corinthians 5:10a): "For all of us must appear before the judgement seat of Christ."


Some of you will be familiar with the court scenes in medieval cathedrals? The horrible grimaces on those faces would surely have frightened the people of that time. Fortunately, those days are over. And yet the Bible speaks of the Last Judgement. This is crucial, not only because of some of the victims who were not justified during their lifetime, but because whoever is judged, will be redirected to the path of mercy and love. That can be painful. So this second-last Sunday in the liturgical year conveys the fact that judgement is also salvation for us and for everyone who suffers from their own actions. In fact, it casts light on how we should actually be: well and good. Christians and the whole of creation can hope for (and look forward to) this judgment, because they know the kindness of their judge. With this expectation in mind, they can also make their own lives more merciful today.

Watchword (Zechariah 9:9a): "Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he."

When politicians are on a state visit, they often enjoy being adored by the crowd: children wave flags, the streets are adorned with flowers. The First Advent encourages you to prepare for an arrival whose importance cannot be estimated high enough.

Jesus too was greeted once with great rejoicing when he entered Jerusalem on the back of a donkey. People beckoned with palm branches and put clothes on the street – as for a king. "Lift up your heads, O gates!" (Ps 24) is also said in Advent. It is the time of inner preparation for this particular King: powerful, but not to fear, a ruler who brings justice and peace. He seeks entry into me. Who waits for him, hopes for peace and a more just world. To greet him means to open your heart wide for God and the people next to me.

Coffee table, Baked Goods, Lebkuchen Hearts, Lunch table, Hand Crafts, Books, Plants and others.


Easter Market 2022

LWF: commitment in public space

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) is joining forces with the Berlin Institute for Public Theology in Germany and the Beyers Naudé Centre for Public Theology in Stellenbosch/South Africa to produce a series of materials. The aim is to help member churches strengthen their engagement in the public spaces.

LWF General Secretary Martin Junge said such resources were urgently needed as "prevailing trends of individualization are leading to a retreat from the public spaces." The more the sense of common good disappears, the more "the common ground between people and communities shrinks," with the result that "eventually common sense is lost."

Junge noted that churches are not exempt from such tendencies towards seclusion. But they are "excellently equipped to counter such trends" by mobilising their spiritual and theological resources. By its very nature, "faith is always personal" but "never private," he stressed, because "faith both forms community and leads to community."

The series of lectures on public theology is freely available in the form of video and audio files on the websites of the three organisations. Presentations, study texts and additional reading material are also available there. The presentations are given by leading public theologians from around the world. They also include discussions on what public theology means in different contexts, including from an Islamic perspective and in the context of the digital world.

A second part focuses on the practical application of public theology in politics and economics, peacebuilding and human rights, gender and sexuality, and creation and sustainable development. Philip Peacock, Acting General Secretary for Programmes of the World Communion of Reformed Churches: "The question is not why there is suffering in the world, but rather what we can do about it. And that, of course, is a very public question."

The academic dean of the ecumenical institute in Bossey, Switzerland, Simone Sinn, also welcomed the new platform. She said access to such "fresh and substantive theology" is much needed in today's global church because "it broadens our theological imagination, sharpens our theological discernment and

Private and public area

Three of the people who contributed to the lecture series also shared their thoughts on the importance of public theology in their different contexts.

Rothney Tshaka, Director of the School of Humanities at the University of South Africa, highlighted that in his country, "Black Liberation Theology has always been public theology," even when "it was not fashionable to talk about your faith in public."

Seferosa Carrol, World Council of Churches programme officer for mission and mission from the marginateds, said she had grown up in the Pacific in a context where faith had been confined mainly to the private areas and Sunday worship. She said she was looking forward to being involved in a lecture series because "it became imperative for me to decipher the connections between the private and public areas."

Another speaker, Frederike van Oorschot, head of the "Religion, Law and Culture" department at the Forschungsstätte der Evangelischen Studiengemeinschaft (FEST), stresssed the importance of talking about "how digital spaces shape our understanding of the public areas and our interaction between Christians."

The director of the Berlin Institute for Public Theology, Torsten Meireis, held that the current lecture series "is only a beginning." He added that "many more voices should be heard."

Dion Forster, Director of the Beyers Naudé Centre for Public Theology at Stellenbosch University, echoed these sentiments and encouraged others to "join the conversation in the future."

The discussion was moderated by the LWF's Program Officer for Public Theology and Interfaith Relations, Sivin Kit. He stressed that "providing access to voices from different parts of the world" does not mean "we are limited to arguing about definitions and concepts." He concluded by saying that it was rather about "mobilising individuals and communities for greater engagement in the public areas."



Financials


Dear members and friends

We cannot and must not fall behind again until the end of the year, so I appeal to you once again to transfer increased contributions in November and December. The chart below shows your monthly contribution payments (2020 in light blue, budget 2021 in white and actual 2021 in red. For the payments we need more than R 20'500 in November and R 24'500 in December.



In addition we want to pay back our MTL loan to the Cape Church. (remaining amount R 32'500). We started repaying the loan of R 165,400 in 2018 and the remaining amount is R 40,700 (of which you already donated R 8,280) We are in need of the remaining amout of R 32'500
