

Mark 11:1-11

This passage is all about Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. This text traditionally is read at 1st Advent, in preparation for the coming of the Lord. It is good news, it is the fulfilment of the prophet Zechariah's prophesy. Here the prophecy, Zechariah 9; 9. "See, your king comes to you, righteous and having salvation" has been fulfilled.

While in the USA many years ago I traveled together with Dr Harry Wendt and a Pastor from Indonesia. The latter told us that when government officials or Church leaders visit an Indonesian village, these people get a very enthusiastic welcome from the village people.

But often the villagers have such expectations of their guest that they do not listen to what he or she really has to say or can do, but see him/her through their own desires.

Did those who received Jesus with praises to God really believe in Jesus as their Lord and Messiah? Or did they see in him the chance to realise their own desires for national salvation and for prosperity? Or did they find themselves shaped by his vision?

Do we see the coming Christmas season maybe also as a time where we cherish our hopes and see a chance to have our own desires fulfilled. Or do we, in preparation for this Christmas season, allow ourselves to be shaped by Jesus' vision?

Throughout the world, new huge church buildings are built. Why? To praise God, or our wealth? Bibles are distributed throughout the world. Why? So we can follow God, or show off our piety by holding it in our hands?

Do we praise God because he has brought us what we want? Or do we praise him because he has shown us a new way?

May this Advent and Christmas season help you to find the new way of God which he introduced when he became human in Jesus on that Holy Night which we celebrate with all Christianity over many generations.

He showed us the way of a loving servant, pointing beyond himself, namely to God. And when the angelic host sang, they sang glory to God in the highest, and knew that the way that Jesus brought into this world, is the only way to peace.

Many of you will be joining the "big trek" to the holiday resorts of our country. Some of you will be going abroad. Wherever you will be travelling to, travel safely.

The crime writer Agatha Christie tells in her life story: "I remember one of the teachers ... She was skinny and small and had a protruding chin. Quite unexpectedly one day (in the middle of a mathematics lesson) she made a speech about life and religion. All of you - every one of you - will go through a time of hopelessness. If you have never been in a desperate situation, you will never have become a true Christian or known a Christian life. To be a Christian, you must face life and defy it, just as Christ faced life and defied it.

You must enjoy the things He enjoyed ... But you must also experience, as He experienced, what it is to remain alone in the Garden of Gethsemane with the feeling that all your friends have abandoned you, that those you loved and put your trust in have turned their backs on you, and

that God Himself has abandoned you. Then hold on to the faith that this is not the end. If you love, you will suffer, and if you do not love, you will never understand the meaning of a Christian life.' After which she returned with her usual energy to compound interest calculations. But it is strange that these words stuck in my mind more than any sermon I have ever heard, and gave new hope many years later at a time when I was filled with deep despair," she recounts.

At the end of her book she writes:



The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light.

Isaiah 9:2

"Faith, love, hope, that is the name of the often quoted trinity. But perhaps we sometimes pay rather little attention to the third virtue. Of faith, one could say, we have often already had too much ..

That love is the essential, we know in

our hearts. But how often do we forget that there is also hope ...? We are close to despair, to taking refuge in the words: 'What is the point of it all anymore?' Hope is the virtue we should cultivate more than anything else in this day and age."

There are depressing times behind us. The Advent season strikes new notes. It used to be a time of penance and fasting. Fasting days were observed. Women wore dark or black to church. The organ fell silent. Nowadays, Advent is a time we look forward to. We celebrate with all our senses, with our eyes, ears and nose. The smell of cinnamon, cardamom and mulled wine wafts from the kitchen. Fir branches and candles decorate the home.

The old Christmas carols are sung

Proverbs 13:9

again, even if we already falter at the second verse. And outside, the streets glitter with a thousand lights. And if we are already grey-haired Advent sceptics who have experienced everything so many times before, the children infect us anew with their an-

ticipation. But with all that warms our hearts, the most important thing is hope.

The prophet Zechariah speaks urgently to us this month. Although he has been through hard times and may still be in the middle of the mess, he does not look back. He does not bury himself in resentment, bitterness and lamentation.

He does not leave the future to fear. Hope is his elixir of life.

Remember: God has not forgotten us. God gives us new courage, even in the midst of dark times. There is a much bigger space than my little life. "Rejoice and be glad, O daughter of



The following regulations apply:

- ♦ Max. 45 persons per service
- Bring and wear your face mask the whole time. Sanitize and sign the Register.when entering the church
- ♦ 3 persons per pew (1-1-1) or for couples (2- -1), larger families from the same household can sit together
- every second pew remains free
- foyer and mezzanine have additional chairs 1.5 m apart
- The Organ will play and you can sing the hymns. The lyrics will be projected (no hymn books).
- Communion is received individually (disposable cups)
- No gatherings before/after service.

Below is an overview of the daily number of people actively infected with the Corona virus in the Eastern Cape (EC red) and the neighbouring provinces of the Western Cape (WC dark blue), Northern Cape (NC orange), Free State (FS light blue), KwaZulu Natal (KN green), and for comparison, Gauteng (GP, pink) South Africa as a whole (ZA dotted black). For better comparison, the data was scaled to persons with the disease per 100,000 inhabitants. The period is 1 May 2020 to 3 December 2021.


Each on has a special meaning. The **1st candle** is **hope**. When we look at this candle, we celebrate the hope we have in Jesus Christ.

The **4th candled** is the candle of joy. It reminds us of the wonderful joy we find in Jesus.


The **5th candle** reminds us of the **birth of Jesus**. The flame of this candle tells us that He is the light of the world.

Watchword (Isaiah 40:3.10):

Watchword (Philippians 4:5b):

"Rejoice in the LORD always; again I will say Rejoice. The LORD is near."

Rejoice, you who are hungry! Joy can be nice. Insignificant people begin to shine when they are looking forward something: to voung mothers, who, like Mary, expect a child, lovers who are looking forward to their loved ones.

The fourth Advent speaks of most radical and changing joy. The Lord is near! The message cannot be kept to yourself. Like Sarah, who is promised a son at her age, and Mary, who praises God, who raises the low, and brought down the powerful from their thrones, we too can be infected with the joy of the divine yes to us - and thereby become kinder and more beautiful.

24 Dec 2021 09:30 (Fam E+D) Christmas Eve



Watchword (Luke 2:10b.11):

" 'Do not be afraid; for see - I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord."

After the hustle and bustle of the preceding days, it is pleasant to return to the church on Christmas Eve, to regain our senses with candlelight and music and to hear the message of the Holy Night. Because of Jesus' birth, light breaks into the middle of the night - it does not take much to experience this on Christmas Eve. We hear the old promises of a King of Peace, who find their fulfilment in Jesus, the descendant of King David. He is Immanuel, God-with-us. The night of his birth recalls the deep mystery of God: in this poor little child, in Jesus Christ, he shows himself. Here and nowhere else is God's truth hidden.

Watchword (John 1:14a):

"And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory."

For me, friends are people, I do not have to hide from, who like me, even when I say something stupid, and who do not look down on me when I make a mistake. Friends do like me the way I am. In Jesus God looks at us in a friendly way, he meets us at eye level, this is the theme of Christmas Day. The shepherds, who set out on the word of the angel, find out first: In the small, helpless child there is a God they need not hide away in shame from. They must not and need not lift themselves up to this God in order to reach Him, because He comes down to them. Yes, even more: in this child God makes them and all people His sons and daughters, heirs to his promise. And Christmas is only the beginning. Those who, like the shepherds, make their way to the manger, will return in a different way: moved and touched by the great love of God.

Sermon Psalm 85

2 January 2022 09:30 (D) First Sunday after Christmas



Watchword (John 1:14b):

"We have seen His glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth."

The encounter with the child in the manger can change people. In him the hope of salvation is fulfilled. Simeon and Hannah sing of this in the Gospel. With Jesus, the light has come into the world. Again and again, people have recognised this in amazement - like Simeon, who trusted the old promises and was allowed to see the Saviour with his own eyes. He has grown old and grey. But his eyes are young and shining into the distance. "You're crazy!" say some. "Give it a rest. Nothing will change." Friends have turned away shaking their heads, others have died bitter. Quietly, patiently, he continues to wait, trusting in God who does not forget his people. Year after year, day after day. As he holds the child in his arms, he opens his eyes in sudden recognition: He has not waited in vain. And even though this little one is weak and persecuted - Simeon sings: "My eyes have seen your Saviour".

SACC - South African Council of Churches



The South African Council of Churches represented by General Secretary, Bishop Malusi Mpumlwana, attended on 30

November 2021 the hearings in Kwa-Zulu Natal (KZN) hosted by the South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) in reviewing the incidents of civil unrest in KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) and Gauteng earlier this year.

Bishop Malusi's attendance was a demonstration of solidarity with the SAHRC in working to uncover the full impact of the unrest, on all the affected. The SACC in August expressed the hope that these hearings would leave no stone unturned in identifying the motivating lint that set fire to the ready context of poverty and want, and which resulted in millions of rands lost and businesses destroyed. with the loss of human life having been the ultimate price paid. The hearings are scheduled to allow for testimony from academics, journalists and the president of the South African shack dwellers' movement, also known as Abahlali baseMjondolo. Today the National Commissioner of Police, General Sithole, was continuing with his testimony.

"Our presence here today is to support the work that began earlier this year", said Bishop Mpumlwana. Together, the SACC through its Local Ecumenical Action Networks

(LEANs), its provincial chapter - the KwaZulu-Natal Christian Council (KZNCC), and the active interfaith collaboration of the Hindu priests, the religious community has played its own role in active ministry on the ground in Phoenix. "

We have worked with community leaders and law enforcement to bring healing and peace to the area. We have met with the bereaved families, and heard of their pain, and met with business owners who have lost their livelihoods.

These hearings today serve to demonstrate that the countless injustices have not fallen on deaf ears, and this process seeks to acknowledge the pain, and make recommendations of how to remedy the situation, to allow us move past this point in our nation's history," said Bishop Mpumlwana.

The SACC will continue in its support of the SAHRC hearings.

Synod held in Philippi 29 to 31 October 2021

A big thank you to the Philippi congregation for being excellent hosts during the synod meeting. The delegates all felt at home immediately, and were ready to engage in the important matters regarding being church here and now. The theme "Life, Faith, Hope. - Here! Now! Getting from disorientation to re-orientation" was very relevant, as we all struggled on various levels during the pandemic.

A reflection on the book of Psalms by Pastor Felix Meylahn equipped us to use these prayers as a wonderful resource to live life fully during these uncertain times. Mrs Hanna Kotze, a social worker from Port Elizabeth, gave us tools to deal with trauma not only in our own life, but also that we can journey with others who face situations of trauma.

Many small group discussions created an opportunity to support and encourage one another.

Please make an effort to have a look at what was discussed and decided! Good and constructive discussions enabled us to find amicable solutions on complex matters raised through the motions. A matter of concern is that a number of congregations are struggling financially. It was encouraging to see how, as church, we found ways to **be** church with and for one another by assisting generously. The dire country-wide and global economic situation has placed great strain on our congregations financially. But let us remember that we are not left on our own. We are God's church. May He give us wisdom and guidance to be good stewards of what belongs to Him.

Pastor Gilbert Filter was re-elected as bishop/chairman of Church Council and Pastor Hans-Peter von Fintel was elected as Deputy chairman of Church Council for 4 years. Pastor Claudia Nolte-Schamm was elected as ordained member of Church Council for 2 years.

Pastors' Convocation

The pastors met at the Andrew Murray Centre for Spirituality, a retreat centre of the Dutch Reformed Church, in Wellington from 26-28 Oct 2021. It was the first time the pastors met in-person since the beginning of the pandemic.

With four new colleagues joining the Convocation it was a good opportunity to build relationships and grapple together with matters on what it means to be church here and now. New and refreshing impulses stimulated the discussions.

A statement was drafted with the title: "What are we learning from Covid for the future of our church?"

This statement was endorsed by the Synod and subsequently shared widely on ecumenical platforms, the

media and through the Lutheran World Federation. Much positive response has been received.

Covid has taught us...


- to be able to adapt, re-think and re-imagine.
- to find new ways to be church with the people and to reach them in their situation.
- new ways of doing worship and fellowship.

- to form new meaningful habits (e.g., daily prayer/devotions via WhatsApp).
- to rethink the whole concept of big church buildings and big gatherings (and maybe move again towards smaller housetype church services and structures).
- we can be more flexible and adjustable than we ever thought before and are able to make decisions much faster than we normally do in church.
- to embrace and enhance our electronic communication (and to make better use of digital opportunities in our ministries).
- that through social media we can reach more people than we would normally.
- that Holy Communion at home is possible.



Covid has opened and is opening our eyes to the following:

- Societal (collective) trauma is real.
- There is a long list of traumatic experiences: immense loss and resulting grief, fear and even anger, insecurity and vulnerability, loneliness, etc.
- Loneliness and depression due to social distancing, not meeting regularly and fewer opportunities to engage with others.
- Effective pastoral care will become even more important to the church's ministry.
- People need support and to be connected to a community/ network that provides stability.
- We have to work on creating a sense of belonging and understanding.
- We have to find new ways of caring (via phone or other platforms).
- We have to visit each other. Especially the elderly and sick should no longer be isolated.
- We need to be able to touch and hug each other, especially at funerals and in times of distress.



Relationships/communion are vital.

- There is a need for belonging, for intimacy, for meaningful communion – without fear or social distancing.
- Regular in person meetings are necessary.
- As church we need to sing, celebrate, worship, share meals and connect with one another.
- The church must work hard to provide genuine communion, connectedness, safe spaces – and this also across borders between races, cultures, classes, generations, language groups, etc. This also implies working towards real reconciliation in our communities.
- The mask has become something to hide behind, with the result that people become more brutal and less compassionate in

- what and how they communicate. In time we hope to put away the masks, so that we can understand people talking, read facial expressions and not hide behind them.
- We need to move away from a self-centred church with a clubhouse mentality to a more open and ecumenical church.



I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you. John 13:34

- Many especially young people are even less visible in church than before. Faith is becoming more and more "private" and less outward-looking. There seems to be "indifferentism" which has made us nearly incapable of compassion that goes beyond our own circles.
- Our focus cannot only be on our own communities; we must look beyond and promote an outreach heart in our congregations.



In God we live and move and have our being.

Acts 17:28

Community involvement is even more urgent than before.


- The church must become more involved in community projects and diaconal service: emergency relief, community development, prophetic (public) witness, ecumenical cooperation, etc.
- However, we observe that members have not shown much interest in helping the community.

Life is vulnerable.

- Covid has shown us how vulnerable life itself is, our environment, ecological crises, dwindling resources.
- We need to live with much more responsibility, sharing living space with others and with coming generations. This also

entails mindful living, living with respect and in wonderment about life itself. This should be a deliberate part of the church's message.

- The church must be part of establishing a new, sustainable economy, with meaningful jobs being created and poverty alleviated. Greater equality/access to opportunities in many areas of life is urgently needed.
- We must assist in working towards a recovery of the damages done to our living environment, ecological awareness, less greed, more responsible living.
- We must return to a simpler life, with less consumerism and materialism.
- We must be part of building a more just, peaceful South Africa, with criminal and violent activities diminishing.

The church's voice must be heard.

- A discourse on God and God's role in We will have to work very hard to speak openly and in a credible way about God in this modern, changing world. We have to engage in the public discourse with much more credibility.
- this new world (and specifically the world of the pandemic) has mostly been absent from the current public discourses. The role of science and politics, the questions about economy and natural resources, even wild conspiracy theories and post truth reasoning have dominated the discourse on public forums. It silenced the voice of the church. And too often the bizarre responses of some churches/church leaders added to the church's voice not being taken seriously.

Digitalisation has its benefits, but also limitations, challenges and even threats.

- Observed challenges/threats: No real feedback is given. Despite all the online offers, many yearned for the fellowship at church, as digital services do not provide the same community feeling as we would like. People may now get even more used to the idea of not going to church.
- Sacrament celebration not ideal.
- We need a place to encounter God. Digitalisation makes us lose a 'locale' where God has promised to meet with us in a special way.
- In conflict situations people shy away from face-to-face meetings and prefer virtual meetings.



Going "back to normal"?

NO!

- Covid has highlighted the flaws of what we thought was normal.
- The "Normal" we had before was not good. There are many serious defects of our "normal" civilization that have been made visible by this crisis.
- We hope that we will be able to learn the lessons of Covid and do something about the fault lines in our societies that have been exposed by Covid.
- Societal injustice, the great divide between rich and poor, genderbased violence including patriarchy, unbridled consumerism, individualism and egocentrism, ecological deprivation are the "normal" we do NOT want to return to.
- Instead, what do we want the "NEW NORMAL" to look like?
- Let us re-imagine the church's role and calling.

Medium Term Loan


Prior to 2018, the outstanding stewardship payments to the Cape Church had totalled 165,433. The Cape Church obligingly converted this amount into an interest-free medium term loan. This loan has to be repaid in full on 28.02.2002. So far, due to your donations, we have been able to repay 124'698 ahead of schedule. Many thanks to all donors.

The church committee would like to have repaid the loan in full this year. We still lack the funds for this: R 31'940 (only R 8'800 donations have been received until 30.11.2021. Who can help us to get enough funds?

Dear members and friends

The following page shows an extract from our accounting system.

First of all, a very big thank you to everyone who increased church contributions and donations in November. As of the end of November, we have paid all stewardship contributions to the Cape Church in full. In December, unfortunately, we have to ask again for an additional contribution: if possible, we ask you to pay 10% more in December than in November (if you have paid for an annual contribution, we would be very happy to receive an additional payment of 5%). The chart below shows the monthly contribution payments (blue 2020 actual; white: budget 2021; red: actual 2021).



For the December payment (yellow) we need R29'600 in church contributions. Urgent repairs were needed in the Church Centre, so that we clearly had some additional expenditure. Please have a look at the Children's Church room after the service and note how bright and cheerful it now looks and is nearing completion.
