

Before Covid, a visit to say a supermarket or store was often marked by a rather impersonal interaction with others. Mostly all in a rush to meet some deadline or time schedule.

By contrast now, customers met at the door by an mostly attendant who greets, sanitises their hands and trolley and ensures the masks are worn. In the store most of their people are aware responsibility to others by wearing masks and maintaining social distancing.

Then there was a 100 year old British World War II veteran Capt. Tom Moore who, when the pandemic struck, set a goal of raising £1,000 for UK National Health Service workers. Due to Covid restrictions he was to achieve his distance goal by walking laps in his garden.

This took place in the weeks leading up to his 100th birthday in April 2020. He raised more than £32 million, way beyond his original goal.

Closer to home, our projects team has successfully forwarded a proposal for funding of the Covid-19 "Winter Warmers" assistance project for the needy children of Wabamkela Creche.

Although we are living in hard times, this pandemic is also bringing out the best in us.

From the Pastor's Heart

On the gift to be able to pass on the grace we have received 1 Corinthians 16:1-4 / 2 Cor. 8, 1-9

Dear congregation, dear readers I talk very, very reluctantly about finances. But our congregation has now fallen into such great financial distress that I should say one or the other word about it. I am concerned about the survival of this congregation and her future. We need to all be serious about seeing the Church and the Congregation as our Church and our Congregation and working together for her good. It is not selfevident that we have a church and a pastor. Both the preservation of the church and the post of the pastor must be financed and supported by us, the congregation. Unfortunately, there is no way of getting around that. The time has come for us to say that the future of our congregation and the post of the pastor of this congregation are at stake, and that we must all fight together to keep both.

That is why I would like to look at two short passages from Scripture with you, that have to do with this topic and hope it can help us to put the situation of our congregation and our giving into perspective.

The first text is in the 1st letter of Paul to the Corinthians, chapter 16: 1-4.

The Collection for the Lord's People

Now about the collection for the Lord's people: Do what I told the Galatian churches to do. ² On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made. ³ Then, when I arrive, I will give letters of introduction to the men you approve and send them with your gift to Jerusalem. ⁴ If it seems advisable for me to go also, they will accompany me.

Here Paul mentions the collection almost casually. From the way he puts it, it is hard to recognize how important this collection is for his mission work. He suggests that the collection proves whether Christians care about the good of the church in Jerusalem or whether it leaves them cold as soon as it costs them something. In fact, Paul still has to fight with angelic tongues for the sign of solidarity among the people in Corinth, who seem to have been not so free with their giving. For us, it is also about nothing less than the mission and ministry of our church here on the ground, not only for our parishioners, but also for the community around us. This is an extremely important task that we have as Christians and, since we are in the world, this mission needs also to be financed.

The second text is in the 2nd letter of Paul to the Corinthians 8: 1-15.

A Call to Generous Giving

¹ Now I want you to know, dear brothers and sisters, what God in his kindness has done through the churches in Macedonia. 2 They are being tested by many troubles, and they are very poor. But they are also filled with abundant joy, which has overflowed in rich generosity. 3 For I can testify that they gave not only what they could afford, but far more. And they did it of their own free will. 4 They begged us again and again for the privilege of sharing in the gift for the believers in Jerusalem. 5 They even did more than we had hoped, for their first action was to give themselves to the Lord and to us, just as God wanted them to do. 6 So we have urged Titus, who encouraged your giving in the first place, to return to you and encourage you to finish this ministry of giving. 7 Since you excel in so many ways—in your faith, your gifted speakers, your knowledge, your enthusiasm, and your love from us - I want you to excel also in this gracious act of giving. 8 I am not commanding you to do this. But I am testing how genuine your love is by comparing it with the eagerness of the other churches. 9 You know the generous grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. Though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty he could make you rich. 10 Here is my advice: It would be good for you to finish what you started a year ago. Last year you were the first who wanted to give, and you were the first to begin doing it. ¹¹ Now you should finish what you started. Let the eagerness you showed in the

beginning be matched now by your giving. Give in proportion to what you have. 12 Whatever you give is acceptable if you give it eagerly. And give according to what you have, not what you don't have. 13 Of course, I don't mean your giving should make life easy for others and hard for yourselves. I only mean that there should be some equality. 14 Right now you have plenty and can help those who are in need. Later, they will have plenty and can share with you when you need it. In this way, things will be equal. ¹⁵ As the Scriptures say, "Those who gathered a lot had nothing left over, and those who gathered only a little had enough."

Here Paul reminds the congregations that mutual support is part of its nature from the beginning and that it is about not only paying attention to one's own interests, but also paying attention to the joys and sufferings of others. Even the apostle Paul humbled himself in taking courage and asking his brothers and sisters in faith for financial support for the church and for himself. But he stresses also that it should always be a voluntary gift.

The most important thing, also for us, is that the gift of giving presents itself as grace from God. Because for Paul, a generous gift shows that the giver knows that his/her life is carried and blessed by God. That's why

he presents the Macedonian congregation as an example. They were themselves poor but acted exemplary to the Corinthians, because they were willing to support others voluntarily despite their own hardships. This example can also help us to think again about how good God has been to us and how richly He has blessed us, before we decide on how much to give.

I sincerely hope you understand our concern in the right sense and see that we have nothing else in mind but the good of our congregation – yours and mine - and its call.

I would like to express my sincere thanks for all the support and faithfulness you have shown recently and over all the years and may God continue to bless and keep us in His grace.

We would like to express our thanks for all the generous support that those have already given, even though times are tough. It is deeply appreciated! This generosity is helping to keep the "church doors open".

Unfortunately, our congregation was already struggling financially before Corona. We are truly facing a grim financial outlook for the year.

All planned fundraisers had to be cancelled - most notably the Easter Market and the Christmas Market, which combined had historically brought in R 80 000 to R 100 000. We are also not receiving any rental income from hall hirers.

We are in discussions with the Church Council of the Cape Church, but as you can imagine - all congregations that form part of the Cape Church are facing similar challenges.

The present situation

Fixed costs per month R 48 633 Average income p.m. R 41 066 Shortfall p.m. R 7'567 Repay loan p.m. R 3'500

We must also still plan for our historic debt because of monthly shortfalls in Stewardship contributions since February 2018 to June 2020 in the region of R 193 400.

We would like to appeal to all congregants, but only those that are financially able to, to continue regularly supporting us financially. Any additional support that could help narrow the current monthly shortfall gap will be appreciated.

The watchword from Ephesians reminds us of who and what we are in Christ: Children of Light. LWF Funds "Winter Warmers"

Over the past couple of months the Lock-down has not put a stop to the church committee, in fact the church committee has been so busy that a sub-committee has been created for fundraising, media and ecumenical works. Wait what?! What does this all mean?

I have been working closely with the church committee in creating a crowdfunding platform where we can ask the global community for funds to help us fix our church building and assist us financially with our stewardship arrears. Not only have we started the crowdfunding campaign but we have applied for two ecumenical funding projects one of which is currently going in for review with the Evangelical Lutheran Mission in Germany and one which has been approved by the LWF, Lutheran World Federation based in Switzerland





What does this ecumenical funding mean for Our church? Well we have applied for approximately EUR 5,000.00 from each organisation to assist our congregation with financial relief.

The LWF had funding available for the sole purpose of COVID-19 which they called it the rapid relief fund of which church bodies such as ours could put together a proposal with their application by the 30th of June for any project that we see fit or already operating. It was decided that we would apply for the full EUR 5,000.00 to fund a clothing scheme which would last for four months from July 2020 to assist the children of the Wabamkela feeding scheme. On the 9th of July we received confirmation that our special project called "Church of Peace - Winter Warmers"

was approved for the full amount.

We have partnered with local



stores in Port Elizabeth where we will clothe approximately 40 children and send a staple food item home with them (rice or maize meal in quantities of 10 kgs). They will also receive hand sanitizer and washable face masks.

As the project progresses we'll be able to share more with you and share some of the happy smiles of the children receiving their clothing items.

Read an interview between two churchwardens: Ryan Meyer (RM) and Henry Newman (HN

HN: Ryan, our congregation is new to crowdfunding on the Internet, can you please explain to our church members what crowdfunding means?

RM: It is a form of funding a project or cause by raising money from a large number of people who would each contribute a small amount typically via the internet across many countries.

HN: Are there different types of crowd-funding?

RM: Yes, there are generally you have crowdfunding campaigns for the needy, churches, the sickly and also school trips.

HN: Do you know examples of successful projects?

RM: There are many examples that can be found on the crowdfunding site, these again are only successful if we all work as a team to make it



work by asking our friends and family where ever they may be to help by donating and sharing the Facebook and WhatsApp post.

HN: What is the advantage for us?

RM: This is a way to alleviate the financial burden from the congregation, but this can only work if the congregation helps by sharing and explicitly asking their friends to donate to our campaign.

HN What do we expect from our members?

RM: The main thing is to share the Facebook or WhatsApp post to their friends and family and ask them to each donate no matter the size as every bit helps.

HN: Does this also work for relatives or friends in other countries like Europe, Australia etc.?

RM: Yes, indeed this does work in other countries. It's really simple all they have to do is follow the instructions on the link when entering



their amount that they wish to donate. This is an international platform which is globally recognised.

HN That's great. Can our members make their own donations?

RM: It would be great if each member who has internet could donate to the campaign this way everyone who sees the campaign can see that people are donating and that we really do need the funds.

Those whom may not have access to the internet can donate by the envelope system and letting Pastor Anja know that it is for the Bell Tower project. Donation collected "offline" will also be recorded.



HN: For which purposes will we use the donated money?

RM: The current aim is meet our running target of R250 000.00, Yes I know this is a substantial amount however, this will be used mainly for the fixing the building from all the rainwater damage and the hall floor in order for us to rent the hall out to more people. The idea is to have the hall floor completed and walls painted so that we can invite play schools over to use the hall for their graduation ceremonies etc.

The remaining money will also be then allocated to our maintenance fund to create a warm and inviting look in order to welcome new member to the church.

There after we would then like to have our medium term loan paid up and have the church standing on its own feet.
