From the Pastor's Heart

Blessed are the pure in heart

An examination of the words of Jesus that we find in Matthew 5:8

I have always struggled with this verse in Matthew for the simple reason that I know very well that I am not pure in heart. I listened to a podcast that opened up this verse for me and then I found this article about it, which I would like to share with you, with the hope that you will also recognize and experience the deep consolation that I have discovered in these words of Jesus.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." A thousand years earlier king Solomon had already asked, "Who can really say, 'I have made my heart pure; I am clean from my sin?'" If only those who are pure in heart are blessed, then who can really celebrate? Is Jesus promising to bless only those who have kept their hearts pure?

We must remember that in these verses in Matthew 5, Jesus has been pronouncing his blessings on the poor and broken in spirit, on the meek and humble, on those hungering for, not filled with righteousness. The question before us



though, is whether this should be read as a law or as gospel. Is Jesus condemning his followers for not having pure hearts, or is he pronouncing blessings on the recipients of his own pure heart, his own mercy? I believe that Jesus answers this question for us in the opening verses of John 15:

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit. Already you are clean because of the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me" (John 15:1-4).

In verse 3 of the above passage, Jesus says, "Already you are clean because of the word that I have spoken to you." At the moment of creation, God simply spoke the words, "let there be." and there was. And we find something similar here as Jesus tells sinful Peter, tax collector Levi, and all the other disciples that they are clean, not because they have always kept themselves pure; not because Jesus knows that they have good intentions; not because they have turned a new leaf and are trying to do better. No. Because of the power of his own declarative word, Jesus is basically speaking a new reality into existence. He simply says it, and it is so.

Hebrews chapter 10 clarifies this point even further. In verses 4 to 7 we're told that "it is impossible for the blood of bulls and goats to take away sins. Consequently, Christ came into the world, he said, 'Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body have you prepared for me; in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure.' Then I said, 'Behold, I have come to do your will, O God, as it is written of me in the scroll of the book." (Hebrews 10:4-7). The author of this epistle is interacting with the words of Psalm 40, and he's basically arguing that this Psalm was a prophecy of the coming messiah whose mission was to fulfill God's will. This is essentially what Jesus said of himself in the Sermon on the Mount: "I have not come to abolish the law, but to fulfill all righteousness."

In verses 8-10 of Hebrews chapter 10 we're told that, "When he said above, 'You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings' (these are offered according to the law), then he added, 'Behold, I have come to do your will.' He does away with the first in order to establish the second. And by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."

Notice that in verse 10, sanctification is spoken of in the past tense. We <u>have been</u> sanctified, purified, and cleansed. But how? By trying



harder, or turning a new leaf? No, the text says, "and by that will we have been sanctified." What will is this? It's the will of the messianic deliverer himself, the one spoken of in Psalm 40 who came to do God's will for us. Jesus said something to this effect in John 17:19 when he prayed, "For them I sanctify myself, that they may be truly sanctified." It was Jesus who submitted to the will of his father, he fulfilled all the righteous demands of the law, and also offered himself as propitiatory sacrifice for our redemption. And so the author of Hebrews concludes by saying:

"Therefore, brothers (and sisters), since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh, and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water" (10:19-22). What bold pronouncements! Here we

are called to have confidence and full assurance that Christ, both by obedient life and sacrificial death, is enough to present us holy and blameless and pure. In short, we are pure, not because of anything we have done, but because of Christ's own declarative word. He has washed us with his blood and has cleansed us with pure water. This is why in Romans 8:1 Paul says that "There is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus." This is why we do not have to fear God's coming judgment, or a period of indefinite suffering in purgatory that purifies any remaining sins (Roman Catholic teaching). If you are in Christ, "Already you are pure" (Jn. 15:3), because of the power of his declarative word. "Out of the anguish of his soul," Isaiah wrote of the coming Suffering Servant, "he will make many to be accounted righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities" (Is. 53:11). By His will, "we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." Therefore... Blessed are the pure in heart!; for they shall see God.

This is our all-encompassing hope in life and in death ...

We are excited to announce that from our last update where we had received the funds from the Lutheran World Federation, we are now able to start the purchasing of all the items that the children will receive. The Wabamkela Feeding Scheme officially re-opened their doors on the 1st of after being closed September throughout levels 5, 4, 3. Upon reopening not many children returned as they all live with their grandparents or other family relatives. Initially only on 11 children went to school in the first week of September. By late September a total of 21 children are back at the Wabamkela class with 29 children in the older age group back in Wabamkela-Masifunde This is a total of 50 children that we are going to clothe and feed for 3 months. The project required some adjusting as the initial number of children was set at 40 children.

On the right is a break-down of what each child will receive over the course of 3 months.

- * Hand Sanitiser
- * Toothpaste and Toothbrush
- * Soap
- * Maize Meal
- * Rice
- * 2 Re-usable face masks
- Warm Jacket Pants (Jeans)
- * Tracksuit Set
- * Shoes
- * Socks
- * Blankets
- * Beanie and Gloves

The Purchasing will commence in the first week of October and be distributed to the children at the Wabamkela facility. As the project progresses further updates and announcements will be made. The Committee would like to thank each and every congregant for all their donations thus far towards the Wabamkela children along with the additional funding from the LWF

Sola Fide (By faith alone)

"For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law." (Romans 3:28)

Sola Scriptura (By Scripture alone)

"All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work." (2.Timothy 3,16-17)

Solus Christus (Through Christ alone)

"For there is one God; there is also one mediator between God and humankind, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself a ransom for all - this was attested at the right time."


(1 Timothy 2:5-6)

Sola Gratia (By grace alone)

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God - not the result of works, so that no one may boast. Jeremiah 29:7

"But seek the welfare of the city and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare."

As we emerge with gathering the lockdown steps from circumstances of the past six months there can hardly be a for us more apt passage ponder, this month. Reports organisations from across our city gathering in silent protest highlight the urgent need to rescue our crumbling municipality. Service delivery has all but come to a halt in Nelson Mandela Bay, spurring civil society, churches, unions and business owners to ioin hands in front of the City Hall to "stop the rot".

During Jeremiah's long ministry he warned God's people of the catastrophe that was to fall upon the nation because of their idolatry and sin and he lived to see the prediction come true with the fall of Jerusalem. But he was steadfast in the prophecy to the day when there would be a new covenant. "Pray to the Lord on it's behalf".

Like the nation of Judah during the reigns of rulers Josiah, Jehoiakim, Jehoiachin and Zedekiah we are saddled with changes in the leadership of our city. We urged are watchword to both ... seek and pray to the Lord for the welfare of the city. Are we therefore not only to pray but actively seek the welfare. Sermon: Matthew 15:21-28

Faith? This question reminds me of my grandmother, saying the evening blessing every day, or of a friend, who hoped that God would heal his mother. I also think of many men and women who went the extra mile, trusting in the power of God, starting aid projects, participating in resistance action, or giving others courage. Faith is not abstract. Faith must be lived. Thus the 17th Sunday after Trinity tells stories about faith: "unbeliever" persists 'confrontation' with Jesus and his apparent rejection turns to acceptance. A father asks for help for his sick son. A blind man regains his sight and is confronted with questions of his faith. Examples of how faith can change people. And if trust does not seem to work for us? A father calls to Jesus, pleading: "I believe, help my unbelief!". And the sermon text tells us: 'I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth.




Sermon: Deuteronomy 30:11-14

Harvest Thanksgiving




Sermon: Ephesians 4:22-32

Questions ...

Many of the members of our congregation often ask us:

- Why is the church sending out letters,
- Why creating crowd funding, asking for all this money?
- Why is there a Medium Term Loan...
- What maintenance has been done or is in progress...
- We always giving but we don't see change...

Why why why ... you ask.

These are very valid questions that hover in your minds and are topics of discussion at home.

We encourage open dialog between the committee and the congregation. The committee is elected by the congregation to lead and maintain the church and manage the finances.

Currently many may not be aware that Pastor Anja is not paid by Germany but indeed by the Cape Church. This is what the monthly contributions is paid towards.

In addition to the contributions that are paid, the church's insurance is paid for by the congregation and so are the utility bills (municipality, telephone, cleaning ...).

The church hall is rented out daily to assist in bringing in funds for the congregation as a whole.

Questions addressed to Church Committee

And with this the hall floor is one of the top priority items to be refurbished along with the water damage to the right of the altar. These are important points and they have to be solved soon, but for that we should have money.

We have created a crowd funding campaign for you to share with your family and friends as another form of "Raffle" without a prize. This money is purely for the maintenance of the church building such as the Hall floor this way we are able to hire the upgraded and well maintained facility out at a higher price allowing us to bring in additional income.

So why was a letter sent out to you personally? You ask... Well what better way to communicate with you if we do not address the letter to you personally. The Church is in dire need of funds and we are opening recognising this and making it clear to each and every congregant. We have to keep the doors open and it is with your assistance that we can continue to do so.

If each person whom is able to do so to contribute towards the "monthly contributions" we would be able to safely say Pastor Anja will be able to continue doing the great work in which she is presently doing.

And what is the medium term loan then? This was an assisted payment plan that was agreed upon to assist the us in paying back the outstanding stewardship contributions. By the time that the agreed payment plan is complete we are however still going to be in arrears with the outstanding contributions to date.

What this means is we are trying to pay the Cape Church as much as possible to decrease that owing amount.

To do this we need your help, we need you to share our crowdfunding campaign as well as ask your friends and family to each contribute any amount big or small remember every bit counts. This way we can upkeep the buildings and focus all the other monies coming in on the outstanding contributions.

The current maintenance plans have been severely affected by the current COVID-19 situation. But be assured that quotes the Hall floor along with the roof leaks around the building are currently being attended to as a matter of urgency.

We encourage open dialog between the congregation and the committee and hope that we can serve you in the best ways possible.

Church of Peace - Care and upkeep of our Assets



The Friedenskirche/Church of Peace has existed in Port Elizabeth for over 100 years now. The Church building has stood on the current Springfield property since 09.05.1971 (49 years).

Maintenance and upkeep of the Church buildings, Manse and grounds is on-going and important.

Read an discussion interview between two church wardens: Auke Brand (AB) and Reinhard Walle (RW).

RW: Auke, the buildings have been exposed to the elements and much wear and tear over the years. External woodwork is starting to rot, cracks are showing, and painting needs to be re-done. There seems to be so much that needs doing.

AB: I agree, but I think it is more than just a building. This is **our** church and as all things that age with time, it is needing more and more continuous care.

RW: Yes, but there seems to be an on -going stream of things that need attention. Will it ever get done?

AB: Well, I think it is a continuous

process. We carry out inspections of the buildings and list problems needing attention.

RW: What is to be done?

AB: Well, a rewarding way is to regularly plan time each week to tackle the repairs or refurbishment one step at a time. If we do not quite finish then it waits till the next week.

RW: And what have we managed to achieve so far?

AB: Having the list helps as it is easier to get perspective on what we have achieved to date. For example, trees have been trimmed, seized or leaking taps repaired, drains / sewers have been unblocked, safety railings and signage fitted in the hall. Some masonry and painting has been done. A new first aid box has been installed in the hall. The automatic garage door at the manse has been repaired.

RW: And do you and the team enjoy doing this?

AB: Well, we look at it from the point of having fun as well as a challenge. When one is enjoying the challenge, having fun and seeing the satisfying result, it is no longer seen as work when you are having a good time with friends.

RW Is gardening also part of maintenance?

AB: Oh yes. I enjoy gardening at home and when there are pretty

plants or flowers in bloom I sometimes take some slips and plant them at the church. I add some compost before watering as the soil is a bit poor and the plants need extra nutrition. Keeping existing flower beds clear of weeds and pruning back the plants is also a maintenance task.

RW: What about costs. Does the team pay for maintenance costs?

AB: We are mostly re-imbursed by the congregation.

RW: Do you use your own tools and equipment?

AB: Well yes to a degree - especially when it comes to specialised equipment..

RW: Would it maybe be good if the church complex had some basic tools so that it is not always necessary to bring everything from home?

AB: That would be great but we don't want use maintenance funds to buy tools. We already have a large toolbox donated and just need to fill it.

RW: So we need donated tools?

AB: That is the general idea. If anyone in our congregation has say duplicate tools or equipment they no longer need, they could consider donating to help equip our Church tool box. All sorts of hand or power tools in good condition would be very welcome. Power tools do need to be in a safe working condition.

RW: That is great. So how can any-one be of help?

AB: It will be helpful If someone is say to re-arrange their garage or workshop and wishes to donate no longer used or duplicate tools or to offer help with the Church's maintenance projects from time to time,

Financial Status of the Congregation

When I think about the finances of the congregation, the Goethe quote "on top of the world, or in the depths of despair "comes to mind.



Why do I feel like on top of the world? We have successfully tried to get support from outside to be able to carry out urgently needed aid for others.

We approached the Lutheran World Federation, and within the LWF framework of the Rapid Response Fund, our project application was approved and with the approximately R 90,000, we can now provide about 50 children of the Wabamkela crèche with warm clothing, masks and sanitizers, as well as some basic food items.

We later asked the Evangelical Lutheran Mission in Lower Saxony to provide 20 immigrant families with food each month. This project, in the amount of approximately R 160,000, was also approved.

It makes me very happy that our projects are being supported and that the "congregation's treasury" is not burdened.

But when I look at the actual financial situation of the congregation, I am **in the depths of despair**, because the income and the expenses are not in balance.

This year we have to pay the Cape Church 31,500 net per month in stewardship. This amount is an already subsidised amount by the Cape Church, as we are un-

able to meet the agreed upon stewardship levy decided by the Synod.

However we have only received R 20,000 in contributions per month (average Jan to Aug).

In order to fulfil our obligations for 2020, we would need to therefore transfer both the current's year's stewardship balance of R 126,000 (September to December) and the outstanding 2020 shortfall amount (January to August) of R 106,000 by the end of the year (September-December). Converted to the last 4 months of 2020, we must receive R 58,000 in monthly contributions.

In addition we still have the obligation to repay the medium term loan. To date the donations towards this so far cover the repayments and we hope for your continued support for the Belltower MTL project.

The compensation of the total of R 110'000 underpayments stewardship income shortfall in the years 2018 and 2019 is still open.

As can be seen every help is urgently needed - whether small or large - to keep our doors open.

Does a pastor really have to be a superman/superwoman to successfully meet all his/her professional obligations to all of us?


Recently I had to deal with this question more intensively, because the church committee is obligated



to regulate the tasks of the pastor of our 'Peace Church' in the form of a new job profile valid from January 1, 2020.



We, as a church, need to create a carefree framework for the work of a pastor. Yes, we have a beautiful church, the 'Peace Church', we have a functioning community center, we have a parsonage and as a member of the ELCSA Cape Church we also have a pastor.

We are about 200 people or 130 families who need to bear all the costs of "keeping the doors open". We receive no subsidies or grants from Europe or other countries. We are required to pay a monthly stewardship to the

Cape Church for the costs of the pastor's office. In addition, we need pay for all to costs of maintenance and renovation of Our community center as well as all daily expenses -



from communion wine to insurance.
