From the Pastor's Heart

So, what comes up next?

As hard as it was to enter into this lockdown, it now seems almost as hard to contemplate emerging from it. In fact, we don't know when things are going to get better, but we are told that when they do, they won't be the same. I know we are not going back to the way things were no matter how much we miss it. But what will the new normal look like and feel like? Everyone agrees that a certain degree of social distancing - a term I increasingly want to distance myself from - will continue for the foreseeable future. We will wash our hands and wipe down our surfaces and wear masks and avoid crowds. We will continue to fear the virus. But does that mean we will fear each other?

How do we love our neighbors when the measures we must follow to protect ourselves are conditioning us to fear them? I worry that I may not be able to approach people the way I would like to, even when the lockdown lifts. I mean, will we ever hug again? Hold hands in prayer? What will our Divine Services look like going into the future?

Can we find more creative ways to connect and care for one another? Maybe this is also a great opportunity to see if we can find new ways of connecting with one another - or just simply that we connect with one another more than we used to. We don't have all the answers. But we can pray

for them. And to lower our feelings of anxiety maybe it can also help us to say that it's okay that we don't know all the answer

Faith, I'm constantly learning, is trusting that the unknown and the unknowable is held by the One who knows, who understands and helps us to remember the one thing we can know - that a loving God is leading all of us even when we don't know and the path is unclear. And, we have witnessed the Lord's provision during this lockdown. I think it's very significant that up to date not one of our members have contracted the virus as far as we know. That is providence! And we look to him amid whatever tomorrow brings. We may not know the future, but we trust Him who does.

And we are reminded of this in John 10:14 where Jesus said: *I am the Good Shepherd. I know my own and my own know me.*

What is more important than to know Jesus is to be known by him. To be known by him is to be held secure by the grip of His Grace and not by the grip of fear.

Prayer:

Lord, be near us and keep us steadfast in the knowledge that you know us and everyone and everything we care about. Help us to know and care about one another. Lead us when we don't know. Help us not to fear, but to trust in You. Our future is in good hands, your Hands. Amen.

From the Pastor's Heart

Keeping our kids

Growing up going to Sunday School, then on to confirmation class and then going to Divine Services regularly on a Sunday was part of "normal" life for me. Things have changed a lot since then. The simple fact of the matter is that parents are the most formative influence on the life of any child, and if they are not going to be involved in passing on the faith, it's more likely that their faith will be "passed by."

Though I believe parents need to take a more *formal* role in the religious formation of their children, there's something else I believe is even more important in our time: Christian parents themselves need to be rooted in their faith so that they can regularly make use of *informal* opportunities to talk to their children about crucial topics such as who God is and the difference between things like truth and opinion. We need to be able to contrast the Christian worldview with an opposing perspective that we watch in a film or listen to in the lyrics of a song. I believe we should ask our kids provocative "catechetical" questions such as, "What do you think was the basic message of that commercial we just watched, and how do you think it was trying to persuade you?", along with an occasional, "What Bible passages come to mind when you think of this issue?"

If you really want to push the envelope, you can even begin asking your

kids (if they're old enough) tough questions they're likely to get later on in life, such as, "How do you know this is true, since there are a lot of people who have a set of beliefs different from yours?" Or, "Why should I trust the Bible?" In doing so, you'll be preparing your kids to articulate answers that may be useful, not only as they interact with others, but also for doubts that may arise in their own hearts sometime down the road. You'll also be communicating to them that your faith is serious and that it speaks to everything in life. Finally, you'll be doing it all in a way that's relevant, since you'll be addressing issues that come up naturally throughout the course of everyday life. But remember: in order to do any of this well, you need to "always be ready to give an answer to the one who asks. to give a reason for the hope that is in you"(1 Pet. 3:15).

It is my prayer that we find creative ways to meet and engage with one another, adults and children alike, to talk about what we believe and why we believe it. Should you have any ideas, do not hesitate to let me know.


God was in Christ, reconciling the world with Himself, not demanding retribution from the people for their transgressions, and He has laid down in us and for us the Word of reconciliation.


Sermon Text: Luke 19:1-10



Sermon Text: Genesis 2:4b-9+15

Often, I get the feeling that everything is getting too much for me. A big load of worries seems to press down on me: my future, my children, upcoming decisions. And then the many questions that keep me awake at night: Will I arrive well? How do I manage the enormous workload? What do I say? What to wear? But after some time, many of these things turn out to be trivial. "Do not worry so much" this word of Jesus stands over the 15th Sunday after Trinity. The God, who has richly blessed His people through His creation, will continue to care for them, even by others. In that confidence, we could practice in giving up some of that heavy load of our worries for a life that is based on trusting in God more.

Sermon Text: Luke 18:9-14

"Lazarus, come out": In no other story does he, who is "the resurrection and the life" approach the death as aggressively as in the gospel of this Sunday about the resurrection of Lazarus. The verse from the epistle fits in with this: Jesus "abolished death and brought life and immortality" This Sunday opposes the most vulnerable and important thing of the Christian faith: We may suffer death here and now - death loses its power through Christ. This happened already in Jesus' lifetime, when he called people from death to life. Through Jesus' death and resurrection, death is finally defeated. Out of the hope that death does not have the last word. Christians could live more courageously and long-sightedly in love. To adhere to this and to trust that God's goodness is more powerful than death is what encourages us this Sunday.

Covid-19 Pandemic.

Dear Sisters and Brothers, who would have thought in March this year that we would still find ourselves right in the middle of the pandemic cause by the Covid-19 virus. It is great to hear through regular virtual meetings with the pastors what is happening in the congregations.

The times are tough, a lack of normal and a the desire to understand what the new normal possibly looks like does not make it easy, but it enables us to remain focussed on our calling to be church here and now.

In the process we discover that there are many opportunities to be church with the people in different ways than what we were used to.

The virtual platform enables us to reach more people, and yet we realize that we struggle to build trust relationships which are core in being the Body of Christ. Open church in Philippi
